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Patrick Hanks is Professor in Lexicography at the Research Institute of Information and Language Processing in the University of Wolverhampton. He is also a visiting professor at the Bristol Centre for Linguistics (University of the West of England), where, with Professor Richard Coates, he is leading a team investigating the origins, history, and geographical distribution of family names in Britain and Ireland. He studied English Language and Literature at Oxford and was awarded a PhD in Informatics at the Masaryk University in Brno, Czech Republic. For ten years (1990–2000) he was chief editor of *Current English Dictionaries* at Oxford University Press. He is the author of *Lexical Analysis: Norms and Exploitations* (MIT Press, 2013), which presents a new theory of word meaning and language in use. He is a consultant on lexicographical methodology and definition to several institutions throughout Europe, including Oxford University Press, and is a frequent invited plenary speaker at international conferences on lexicography, corpus linguistics, phraseology, figurative language, and onomastics.
